There she principally worked on cultural projects related to sustainability, environmentalism and social justice, including various pavilions at Dubai Expo 2020, the award-winning 'Net Zero' exhibition at Ithra (Dhahran, Saudi Arabia) and 'Somos Agua' ('We are Water') exhibition at Canal Isabel II (Madrid, Spain).

Prior to this, in London Elisa was Curator of the UK National Collection of cinema posters, photography and design at the British Film Institute where she curated exhibitions and projects on post-Partition Indian cinema, Thrillers, and Refugee Week. She was also on the Curatorial team at the Victoria and Albert Museum for blockbuster exhibitions that received around one million visitors on global tours, also working on programming, publications and film projects. Her early career spanned the art world (Ben Uri Museum of Art, Identity and Migration, Peggy Guggenheim Collection, Sotheby's), journalism (the BBC, *The Guardian*, Associated Press), translation, and education in Spain, Italy, the UK, Cyprus, Russia and Austria.

Elisa is Newsletter Editor for the ICOM International Committee for Human Rights and Memorial Museums, is on the academic selection committee for the European Association for Heritage Interpretation, and is a member of the Institute for the Inclusive Museum. She previously co-led a research expedition on cultural memory and the future of Socialist monuments and infrastructure in Bulgaria, lectures on museology and culture at universities in the UK and Spain, mentors emerging professionals, and contributes to international conferences. Her writing and research cover solidarity, memorials, and the role of artists in communities affected by conflict, in relation to which she founded an archive of print production in 2016.

Elisa has a degree in Modern Languages from the University of Cambridge and Masters in Contemporary Art and Politics from the Courtauld Institute of Art, London and the MACBA Museum of Contemporary Art of Barcelona. She won a scholarship to the Harvard University Centre for Hellenic Studies in Greece and also studied at the University of Cyprus and the Metàfora School of Art Therapy in Barcelona.
